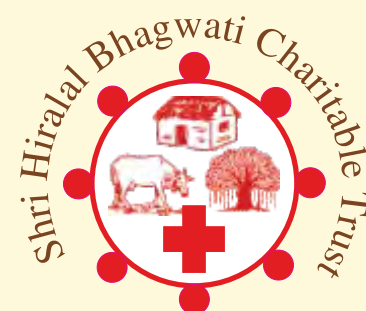

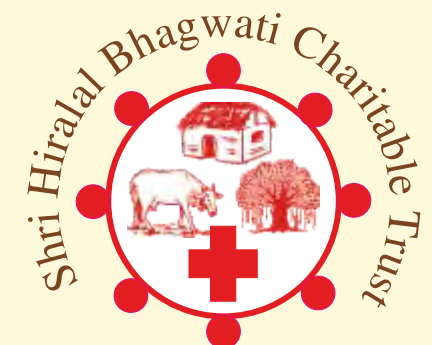

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## Message from the Trustees

This is to present a report on various activities undertaken by Shri Hiralal Bhagwati Charitable Trust during the year 2020-21. Despite all efforts to contain this mysterious virus, it showed all its might as if it were to last forever. The country came to a standstill following a lockdown announced by the government from March 25, 2020 to May 31, 2020, the period when the trust usually kicks off its activities at the onset of a new financial year. Every sphere of life came to a grinding halt for 2-3 months. People were baffled; all plans and programmes were stalled. People were clueless as to what should be done next; how should be done; when will life return to normalcy.

Amidst Covid-19 Pandemic, it was extremely challenging and precarious for the trust to implement its health, education and rural development activities planned by way of institutional and financial goals.

The year of Pandemic was instrumental in teaching and explaining a lot to human race. During this difficult times, when things came to naught for most of the people there were some who showed their grit and determination by treading on the road not taken. It was a lesson for our trust too: convert crisis into opportunity by doing something new... starting something new. That is to say, one should move on leaving behind all difficulties, problems and obstacles. The Show Must Go On...and that is why, this annual report presents a brief summary of the activities we continued undertaking in the areas of healthcare, education and rural development as per our understanding of the situation under the guidance of the experienced experts of various fields as needed in the year 2020-21 amidst uncertainties unleashed by Covid Pandemic and the lurking fear of Corona virus transmission.

## Health

We are rendering healthcare services using modern technology with the help of specialist doctors at concessional rates to the people residing in Dholka city as well as surrounding villages for the past **52 years** through **Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati General Hospital** established using the subvention from our family granted in the fond memory of revered Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati.

**Sustained community health care in Covid Pandemic :** Private hospitals and maternity homes remained closed for a long time when the doctors who resided in Ahmedabad but rendered medical services in Dholka were unable to come to the city due to the strict enforcement of the lockdown coupled with the fear of Corona virus transmission. **Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati General Hospital** was a beacon of hope to pregnant women of Dholka and surrounding villages for treatment and delivery at a time when doctors and medical services were not available in private hospitals of Dholka during the lockdown. Although there were complicated cases among women patients who came for delivery, each of them successfully delivered babies due to the intensive health care services rendered by the hospital. Doctors of **Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati General Hospital** residing in Dholka along with the hospital staff saw to it that the hospital **functioned 24x7** amidst the lurking fear of Corona virus transmission by being frontline warriors for which the entire staff deserves to be commended.

We are delighted to inform that even in the difficult times of Covid Pandemic **Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati General Hospital** facilitated the highest number of childbirth successfully at the concessional charges, the credit of which goes to the dedicated doctors and the hospital staff who are imbued with the spirit of service.

Well-timed, precise treatment and adequate care to every patient during labour and delivery rendered by **Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati General Hospital** has ensured **zero maternal mortality in 1824 deliveries** facilitated by it. The state government has set as its target **the infant mortality rate at 40 per thousand children born**. However, **the infant mortality rate has been limited to 1 per thousand children born at Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati General Hospital** which is a matter of delight and pride for us.

## Education

It was not certain whether the schools would reopen in June 2020-21 at the beginning of a new academic year amid Covid-19 Pandemic. It was impossible to assemble students at one place to facilitate activity-based learning when fear of Corona virus transmission had gripped everyone in villages and cities alike. Under such circumstances, the issues like the kind of education system to be adopted for rural children as well as the method to initiate activity-based quality learning for them occupied our thoughts.

**Online Education through mobile :** Instead of summoning students to the school for new academic year, the state government in mid-June 2020, Announced to roll out home learning – distance education process wherein student of every standard would be imparted education as per their curriculum in home environment. The trust commenced mobile-based online education in 10 villages in the situation when the students were no longer able to come to school.

While facilitating education online, we felt that this method had certain drawbacks which limited online education to very few students. On realizing that there was no solution to these problems, we initiated offline education by forming WhatsApp groups of students as an alternative but the results of this effort were also not very encouraging.

**Learning at home :** Just as we were looking for an effective but practical way of imparting education while taking into consideration the barriers to online education, the advisor of our trust, Dr. Arun Dave, suggested us a new alternative. Following his advice, the trust started teaching activity through home-visits of students using the component of 'Let us Learn at Home' launched as a part of Home Learning Programme by the state government. Despite being a year full of challenges and uncertainties, the trust is happy and satisfied over the fact that it has **given exposures to 18414 students** from standard **1 to 8** of **56 villages** falling under its project area **between July 2020 and March 2021**.



### Educating people to keep the community safe from

**Covid-19 virus transmission :** The trust worked towards creating awareness from April to June among people and children of three villages of Dholka taluka where it has been striving to bring about multi-dimensional development all these years in order to save them from Covid-19 virus transmission. Herbal decoction (**ukalo**) was distributed in villages of Bhoombhi, Vejalka and Kesargadh to boost the immunity of the people. Face masks were distributed to keep people protected from virus transmission. Soaps were also distributed among people to cultivate the habit of washing hands regularly in them.

Thus, though this year was marred by Covid-19 Pandemic, the trust endeavored to serve the society by rendering healthcare through its hospital, ensuring continuity of education among rural children as well as conducting prevention and relief activities for the rural community on a moderate scale.

## Quality Education

Shri Hiralal Bhagwati Charitable Trust launched *Pragatishil Shaala Vikas Yojna* aspiring to enhance the quality of primary education in rural areas as a tribute to late Prabhavatiben Bhagwati to commemorate her birth centenary year in 2014.

Thirteen primary schools of Dholka taluka, Ahmedabad district from 2014 were selected in three phases under *Pragatishil Shaala Vikas Yojna* with an intention to enhance the quality of primary education.

With a view to achieve the goal of enhancing the quality of education in these 13 schools, the trust plans three types of academic activities on annual basis every year:

1. Activity-based learning approach
2. Co-curricular activity
3. Academic activities that are directly useful to students as well as schools

### 1. Activity based learning approach

#### 1.1 A mobile unit to facilitate Activity-based learning

The trust has set up a mobile unit to facilitate Activity-based learning. Duly qualified, trained teachers have been recruited for this unit. The trust has bought a passenger auto rickshaw to convey teachers to schools as per the schedule regularly along with academic resources like science & math kits to conduct activity-based education in schools.

#### Distinctness in activity-based education in the academic year 2020-21 ravaged by Covid-19 Pandemic :

The academic year 2020-21 ravaged by Covid-19 Pandemic posed lots of uncertainties and challenges to the trust as nobody knew when the schools would reopen and when the teaching-learning of students would resume. The government announced a nationwide lockdown to contain the effects of Covid-19. Everything – schools, colleges, coaching classes, training institutes – was absolutely closed until 17<sup>th</sup> May 2020. The state government ordered that students of any standard studying in any type of academic institute shall not visit the institute until 30<sup>th</sup> June 2020 and that every school must initiate Learning at Home Programme in such a way that every student irrespective of standard would be able to continue learning in congruence with the curriculum while being at home.

#### State government's Learning at Home Programme :

To ensure that every student was able to continue learning at home, the state government got prepared study material entitled 'Let us learn at home' to be circulated among students. Online education of students studying from standard 1 to 12 commenced through mobile phone and television (DD Girnar TV channel) along with audio-visual learning content being uploaded on YouTube and DIKSHA portal. At the same time, the state government also directed the local primary teachers to begin online education through virtual class using Microsoft Teams.

#### Teaching-learning activity by the trust using 'Let us learn at home' study material :

Online education through mobile phone began after it had become evident that imparting education to students in schools was not possible. We sought the advice of Dr. Arunbhai Dave, the Managing Trustee, Lokbharati, Sanosara who also happens to be the advisor of our trust when we were stumped by the barriers to online education through mobile phone. Following his advice, the trust furnished students individually with 'Let us Learn at Home' study material which is one of the components of Home Learning Programme by the state government. The trust started imparting education by conducting activities mentioned in the study material through home-visits of those ten students who were weak in studies and were students of 10 school sselected by it.

#### Well-planned academic activity on the basis of 'Let us Learn at Home' study material :

1. First of all, the team of trust appointed teachers were sent to the team of experts who had prepared 'Let us Learn at Home' study material in order to train and orient them to facilitate academic activity adopting a new approach (i.e. teaching students individually at their homes on the basis of activities given in the study material)
2. Following the teacher's training, ten primary schools were chosen from 13 primary schools of Dholka taluka selected under the trust's *Pragatishil Shaala Vikas Yojna* for academic activity.
3. A monthly schedule was prepared to facilitate education in the chosen ten villages.
4. A list of 10 students (5 girls and 5 boys) who were weak in studies was obtained from the local school with the goal set to impart education to around 800 students every month.
5. It was decided to mark regular attendance of the selected students. It was also decided to make either a student or the guardian sign the daily visit form and click the student's selfie individually in the mobile of the trust-appointed teacher.



6. Antigen tests of the trust-appointed teachers were done in order to ensure that students and teachers were not infected with the virus by each other. The teachers were given face masks, hand gloves and sanitizer apart from a thermal gun between two teachers (to measure body temperature of students) and additional masks to be given to students who did not have them. Teaching-learning activities of children were planned abiding by Covid-19 SOP.
7. The teachers went to the homes of 10 students as per the list abiding by Covid-19 SOP and started teaching them individually at home using 'Let us Learn at Home' study material.







8. Four teachers of the trust started at 10 am from Dholka in the trust-owned passenger rickshaw only to return at 5 pm after completing the teaching work daily.
9. The trust-appointed teachers could, on average, spend 20 to 30 minutes with every student at their home on daily basis. The trust had allotted two standards to every teacher for teaching-learning activity wherein the teacher imparted education to 10 students of one standard on the first day and the other 10 students of another standard on the next day of the same village. The trust-appointed teachers were scheduled to visit any village twice a month.
10. Teaching-learning activity undertaken by the trust-appointed teachers:



**(10.1) The trust-appointed teachers, during their individual teaching- learning activities, endeavored to aid students in largely two ways:**  
 (A) To assist students in carrying out the activities given in 'Let us Learn at Home' study material by providing them with the necessary tools from the trust.  
 (B) The teachers opened the link by scanning the QR code embedded in the lessons of 'Let us Learn at Home' study material in their mobile phones and showed them various videos of educational activities. The video described the method to undertake the activity as mentioned in the lesson as well as it contained supplementary material like rhyme, action song, story, play, riddle etc. corresponding to the lesson.



#### **(10.2) Unit Test/ Counseling students of Std. 3 to 8 to prepare for the first test**

The government of Gujarat conducted periodic assessment test for students of Std. 3 to 8. The Education department of the government drew question papers of different subjects to be given to students every month. The students wrote answers of these question papers in the unit test book provided by the government. Students

were mentored by the trust-appointed teachers in preparing to answer each of these unit tests and periodic assessment tests so that they could fare well in the tests.

**(10.3) Revising the curriculum :** In the month of March 2021, the trust-appointed teachers reinforced the syllabus of both terms by undertaking revision of it through *Quizola method* (a game to find answers based on questions).

11. When Covid-19 transmission reduced in the rural areas after October 2020, the trust-appointed teachers imparted education to students in the group of 5-10 in a public place of the village in two sessions – two hours in the morning and three hours in the afternoon – while adhering to Covid SOP.
12. **Our experience of 'Let us Learn at Home' teaching method :** We are indeed very happy to share some of the memorable experiences which the trust-appointed teachers had in teaching students at their homes.
  - Initially, when the teachers went to impart education in the village, some villagers and students thought them to be health workers from a government hospital who came for Corona test; so, the students went into hiding out of fear.
  - There was lots of cooperation from the parents in every village. Welcoming the teachers warmly, they stated: “Good that you came. These children will learn something; otherwise they roamed about the whole day”. The teachers felt that in many homes, the parents curiously observed them teaching their children. Some parents would arrange for an air-cooler to beat the heat and would not let them go without having tea.
  - Most of the students participated in academic activities with great interest and eagerly waited for teachers to come the next day. However, there were few students who did not have any interest in academic activities and so, would not join them despite being called frequently for it.
  - Children had lots of fun when the teachers showed them videos scanning QR code embedded in the lessons of 'Let us Learn at Home' study material in their mobile phones.



- The village-dwellers, by and large, were not just happy but also satisfied over the method of teaching students in their homes.



- Students of std-1 were too young to have the experience of going to school; so, when the trust-appointed teacher visited home of such student for teaching work, the child would start crying. The teacher would be able to resume the teaching work only after calming down the child with love and care, giving chocolates and making the parent sit by their side.

The four teachers appointed by the trust imparted education to **4074 students studying in std 1 to 8 of the selected ten schools of Dholka taluka during the period of July 2020 and March 2021.**

## 1.2 Activity-based learning with the cooperation of Agastya International Foundation

With the financial support by the trust, activity-based learning by Agastya International Foundation has been undertaken in 37 villages of Dholka taluka. The trust has made financial arrangements on permanent basis to ensure that their academic activities continue uninterruptedly for a long period of time. Covid-19 Pandemic had an impact on the educational activities of Agastya International Foundation as students are in the centre of their educational activities. The approach was that students learn Maths and Science using Hands on activity kit but they adopted the following strategy when it became evident that students would not be able to come to school for studies:

1. Online education through mobile phone/ virtual class
2. Offline education creating WhatsApp groups through mobile phones
3. Imparting education through face-to-face demonstration in small groups by visiting students of selected primary schools

### 1.2.1 Activity-based learning in the subject of Science :

Two units of Science Lab on a Bike (LOB) have been put to use to teach the subject of science through Hands-on activity kit developed by Agastya International Foundation in 24 schools of Dholka taluka since February 2019. **6450 students studying in standard VI to VIII have been taught Science using both the units through face-to-face demonstration in villages of 24 primary schools of Dholka taluka until the end of March 2021.**



### 1.2.2 Activity-based learning in the subject of Maths :

One unit of Mathematics – Lab on a Bike (LOB) have been put to use to teach the subject of Maths through Hands-on activity kit developed by Agastya International Foundation in **13 primary schools** of Dholka taluka since September 2018. **2255 students studying in standard VI to VIII have been taught Maths using one unit through face-to-face demonstration in villages of 10 primary schools of Dholka taluka until the end of March 2021.**



### 1.2.3 Operation Vasanta (OV) Activity:

With the financial support of the trust, OV centres have been started in **10 villages of Dholka taluka under Agastya International Foundation's Operation Vasanta (OV) program since June 2019.** These centers have been set up for the comprehensive development of rural children as well as increase community participation in education. Activities for comprehensive development of children are conducted for 2-3 hours daily in activity centres under Operation Vasanta by educated, trained local volunteers of the village for children belonging to the age group of 7 to 14 years as per the village's schedule. However, these centres were closed during the lockdown which have now become operational. OV centres became centre of attraction for children due to its activities especially when primary schools had remained closed.

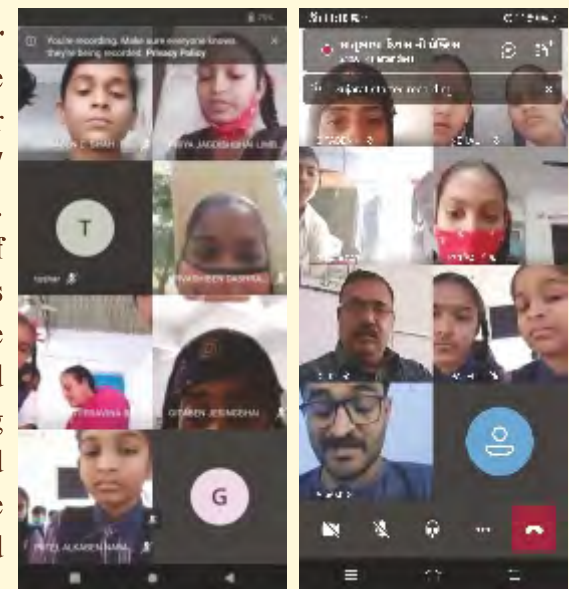


## 2. Co-curricular Activities

The trust had planned several co-curricular activities to be organized under *Pragatishil Shaala Vikas Yojna* for the year 2020-21 but could not be facilitated physically due to Covid-19 Pandemic. However, the following co-curricular activities were organized virtually with the help of Agastya International Foundation:

### 2.1 Celebration of International Mother Language Day :

Every year 21<sup>st</sup> February is celebrated as *International Mother Language Day* across the globe. To glorify the mother language Gujarati and to make students realize the importance of their mother language, an inter-school debate was organized among **selected 37 schools of Dholka taluka on 22<sup>nd</sup> February 2021, Monday** virtually. The topic of this debate was: '**Mother language – the medium of Primary Education**'. The debate was organized for **students studying in std. 5 to 8**. The debate was planned in such a way that the participating students were to be divided into two groups and would express their views online turn-by-turn through mobile phone using Microsoft Team on whether “the medium of primary education should be mother language”. The student joined the debate through mobile phone using Microsoft team app from his/her village / school and presented his/her views.



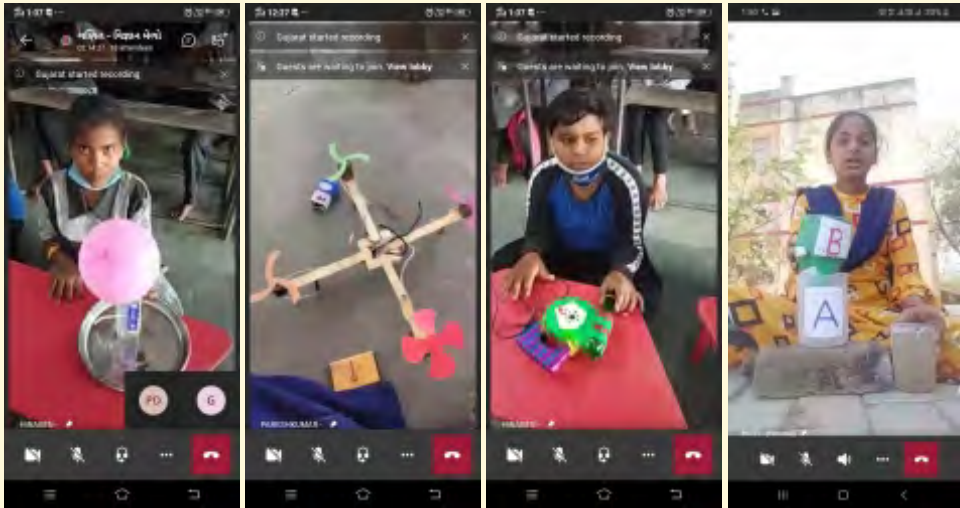
**Virtual Debate**

The virtual debate had been scheduled for one hour between 11:00 am and 12:30 pm but it became so engrossing that it had to be extended by two hours. Gujarati teacher of Vataman Kanya Prathmik shaala conducted the debate nicely. Such arrangements were made that any students of these 37 schools may listen to this online debate through Microsoft Team. **Twenty-nine students including 7 boys and 22 girls of 29 primary schools out of 37 selected schools of Dholka taluka participated in the virtual debate.**



2.2 Virtual Science and Maths Fair :

With the aim of imparting activity-based education to students in the subjects of science and mathematics along with cultivating scientific insight among students, the trust in collaboration with Agastya International Foundation organizes Science-Maths Fair “Jignasa” regularly. An-inter-school virtual Science-Maths was organized on 26/02/2021 for the students studying in std. 6 to 8 of 37 selected primary schools of Dholka taluka. The students who participated in this virtual fair made online presentations of readymade models of Science and Maths or models developed by them using local material through mobile phone using Microsoft Team app.

3. Facilitating academic activities which are directly useful to students as well as schools

Every year the trust organizes such academic activities under *Pragatishil Shaala Vikas Yojna* which are directly useful to students as well as schools. The trust had planned many such activities under *Pragatishil Shaala Vikas Yojna* for the year 2020-21 but no academic activity could be facilitated physically due to Covid-19 Pandemic throughout the year. As students did not come to school physically, very few activities could be undertaken, the details of which are given in Table No. 2.

Aavishkar Science Centre, Maydhar

With the financial aid by Shri Hiralal Bhagwati Charitable Trust, Aavishkar Science Centre has been established on the premises of Pandit Sukhlalji Lok Vidhyalaya Kendra managed by Lokbharti Gramvidyapith Trust at Maydhar village, Palitana taluka, Bhavnagar district since June 2019. Students studying in std. 5 to 8 and belonging to the surrounding villages of the remote Maydhar visit the centre and learn the subject of Science by carrying out activities prescribed in various units of Science curriculum throughout the day.



The subject of Science is being taught to students studying in std. 5 to 8 as per the state government's curriculum by the eligible and experienced teachers trained by Agastya International Foundation with the help of Hands on Activity kit in this centre. In normal situation, the primary schools of the villages surrounding Maydhar would commute their students and teachers to the centre every month as per the schedule drawn by Aavishkar Science Center. However, the teaching work remained closed in the primary schools this year due to Covid-19 Pandemic. As a result, students could not visit the centre in groups and learn Science through activities using Hands-on Activity Kit. Even the centre was faced with a dilemma as to how they could continue such type of teaching-learning activity in such situation. **Teaching work by Aavishkar Science Centre in the exceptional conditional of Covid-19 Pandemic :** Initially, the teachers of Aavishkar Science Centre, when left with no choice, adopted the alternative method of teaching students online using mobile phone but with limited success. Following the trust's suggestion to impart education in the line of 'Let us Learn at Home' study material, a component of Home Learning Programme, the teachers of the centre started visiting the villages surrounding Maydhar and taught the subject of Science through demonstration using Hands-on Activity Kit by assembling students in small groups as done in street school from **October 2020.** In this way, the teachers of Aavishkar Science Centre taught the subject of Science to **5635 students studying in std. 6 to 12 belonging to 22 villages** of Palitana and Talaja talukas through demonstration.



## Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati General Hospital, Dholka



For the past **52 years**, Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati General Hospital has been rendering modern health facilities to the people residing in and surrounding rural areas of Dholka city at concessional rates in the fields of Gynecology, Pediatrics, Medicine and Dermatology. Apart from this, the hospital offers examination, diagnosis and

treatment for common ailments; it also gives patients proper guidance and advice if there is need for further intensive treatment. Tests necessary for diagnosis of a disease are being done in the pathology laboratory of Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati General Hospital at rates more concessional than being done in other hospitals of Dholka. The medical shop of Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati General Hospital provides medicines to the patients at the economical rate.

For the past 52 years, Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati General Hospital has been known for diagnosing and treating gynecological ailments at concessional rates. In the **year 2020-21, 1824 babies were born** in the maternity ward of the hospital with **an average of 152 child-birthsevery month**. Neonatal mortality rate has come down considerably due to intrapartum, postpartum and early neonatal care rendered by the hospital. The hospital has secondary level NICU (Neonatal intensive care Unit) facility that takes care of every newborn. Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati General Hospital gives a baby set (consisting of plastic mat, apparels, diaper and cap) free of cost to the Neonatal born in the hospital.

### Activities by Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati General Hospital in 2020-21

**1. Imparting unflinching health care to people amidst Covid Pandemic :** Every sphere of human life came to a halt when the central government imposed country-wide lockdown in the beginning of April 2020 to contain the impact of Covid-19 Pandemic. However, human beings may need health care services at any point of time. Even in the arduous time when most hospitals in and around Dholka city had shut down due to lockdown and the fear of Covid-19 transmission, the entire staff of each and every department of the hospital resolutely treated the pregnant women, the newborns-children, the senior citizens and the patients suffering from common ailments. Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati General Hospital realized the maxim of **'Service to mankind is service to God'** when it remained operational **24x7** and treated every kind of patient unflinchingly amidst Covid-19 Pandemic while taking all safety measures to ensure that neither the patient nor any of the staff members contract Corona Virus by adhering to Standard Operating Procedure.

### 3. Diagnosis and treatment camp

Usually, Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati General Hospital organized Diagnosis and treatment camp in villages surrounding Dholka city on regular basis. However, following the Pandemic, instead of organizing such camp outside, it organized a one-day Diagnosis and treatment camp in the hospital itself for the benefit of people residing in and around Dholka city on 06/03/2021. Every patient who came to the camp was provided with necessary health care services like medicines, laboratory test, ECG test, etc. free of cost. **A total of 57 patients availed of health care services at the camp.**

### 4. Gynecology Diagnosis and Treatment Camp

The Gynecology department of Shrimati Santokba Bhagwati General Hospital has been rendering the best treatment to women patients at concessional rate since long. In this regard, the hospital organized **2 camps** for uterine surgery (Hysterectomy) at concessional rates for the benefit of women suffering from uterus dysfunction. **A total of 29 women patients underwent uterine surgery in these two camps.**

### Rural Development Activities by the Trust and Public Awareness towards Covid-19 Pandemic

Provision kits were given away to very poor and destitute, ten widows of 3 villages every month this year as a part of rural development activities by the trust.

With the fear of Covid-19 Pandemic spreading to villages looming large, the trust as a pre-emptive measure made people of three villages selected for rural development aware on what Covid-19 virus is, how it infects people and the kind of precautions people need to take in order to stop its transmission.
